FROM THE MINUTES

John Bentley, Secretary

President Tai Gunter called the November 12, 2023 SBEAS membership meeting at the Elkhart Conservation Club to order at 2:02 p.m. Twenty-eight (28) members and guests were in attendance.

- Tai welcomed everyone and called for bird sightings. Among those mentioned were Doublecrested Cormorants, a very far astray Rufous Hummingbird, and Cattle Egrets. One member had taken a video of an Osprey diving and catching a fish.
- Tai reported that he and Melissa Gunter had attended the Audubon National Leadership Conference in Colorado.
- Tai reported that the Society is in the process of setting up an annual scholarship named for Vic and Marge Riemenschneider, to honor their long-time commitment to our Society and to benefit young people who want to go into environmental fields.
- Tai announced that the Board would like feedback from the membership on whether or not we should remove John J. Audubon's name from the Society's name. A link to a website where anonymous comments can be posted appears in the *Audubon Leaves*.

Committee Reports

<u>Field Trips</u>. Carol Goodall will lead a Sandhill Crane trip to Jasper-Pulaski State Fish and Wildlife Area on December 2^{nd} .

<u>Hospitality</u>. Alice Bentley asked for a volunteer to cook a turkey breast for our holiday potluck on December 10th, as well as assistance with decorating the tables for that event. She thanked refreshment providers for the November meeting, Marie Smith and Ruth Middleton, and asked for volunteers for future meetings.

<u>Programs</u>. Bruce Cates reported that in March we will have a speaker from Indiana Audubon Society. He is still pursuing a February speaker.

<u>Sanctuary</u>. Bradley Waelbroeck reported that the November work day at the Sanctuary had eight volunteers. They winterized the pump and summer quarters and cleaned up downed trees and trails.

<u>Other Business</u>. Tai announced that Wild Ones, with SBEAS support, are trying to arrange a lecture by noted author Doug Tallamy.

Treasurer's Report

Martha Kummerer reported that the operating checking account (KeyBank) had a balance of \$28,482.92 as of October 31st, and the endowment checking account (Everwise) held \$11,943.63. She mentioned that \$6,495.24 of the operating funds are an additional component of the Dickey bequest and will be moved to the Dickey CD when it renews.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

28TH ANNUAL ELKHART COUNTY CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT Ronda DeCaire, Elkhart County CBC Compiler

The South Bend-Elkhart Audubon Society and the Elkhart County Parks are calling upon volunteers for the annual Elkhart County Christmas Bird Count, which will be held on Saturday, December 30, 2023.

Volunteer bird counters can participate two ways:

Field Observers will be assigned an area and given maps to count birds within a designated part of Elkhart County. Teams will bird by car and foot from dawn to dusk. Participants should dress for the weather and bring binoculars and field guides. Field observers will meet at Ox Bow House Shelter in Ox Bow County Park on Saturday, December 30th at 7:30 a.m. Ox Bow County Park is located at 23033 County Road 45 in Dunlap. Field sections can also be assigned prior to the date.

Feeder Counters can count birds in their yards. Participants must count the highest number of each species seen at once in their yard on that day. Feeder counts can take place during any amount of time and counters are welcome to count all birds seen from their yard, especially along waterways.

The Elkhart County count circle extends from the state line on the north end to Waterford Mills on the south end, and includes the towns of Bristol, Middlebury, Goshen, and the eastern portion of Elkhart. The center of the 7.5-mile radius for the count circle is the intersection of County Roads 18 and 23.

SANCTUARY REPORT

<u>Bradley Waelbroeck</u>, Sanctuary Chair

We had a Sanctuary work day on November 11th, the day before our membership meeting. There are no more work days scheduled going into winter; the next scheduled work day is March 9, 2024.

All feeders were filled at 8:00 a.m. sharp by Laurie Wood. The Summer Quarters were winterized with the help of our team of eight volunteers. Benches were stacked along the shelves by Jillian Waelbroeck and Jude Keltner with tables then stacked against them. We left one table and a pair of benches out for use so there is a place to rest. The speed bumps have been removed for the winter and placed in the Seed Shed. Please use caution entering and exiting the Sanctuary as all of the beautiful leaves continue to fall, making it difficult to see the pathway. The upstream (west) entrances to all culverts were cleared of accumulated brush to prevent flooding when the thaw comes. The well and pump have been winterized with the help of Dale Keltner, Bruce Cates, Tai Gunter, and Merrilee Britt, so please remember to stay hydrated and bring water with you when you visit the Sanctuary! A friendly newt announced his presence then scurried away when we lifted the lid to the well pit. The grass meadow by the pond was mowed one final time and mowing has commenced on the south prairie field. Two nesting boxes were retrieved from different places in the Sanctuary and taken to the Winter Quarters for repair or replacement. Remember to stay warm as temperatures drop. Wear mittens or gloves, scarves, hats, and a warm coat. A good thing to carry when visiting the Sanctuary during this time of the year is hand warmers. There are even rechargeable electric ones on the market these days!

I would also like to say thank you all for the opportunity to take care of our Sanctuary. We don't just do the things we do for the avians we all adore, we also do them for all of us. Taking care of nature helps us take care of ourselves. I am open to all comments and requests for anything you may notice our Sanctuary needs.

BLACK-CAPPED CHICKADEE (POECILE ATRICAPILLUS) Lindsay Grossmann

Aerobatic and curious, the Black-capped Chickadee is the epitome of the term "adorbs." A small and compact songbird with a short bill, these birds can look like little fluffballs, especially when it's cold. They are one of our smallest birds to overwinter in this area, where they take up residence in forests of all types all year long. Their black cap and chin contrast dramatically with their white cheeks, gray back and wings, and buffy belly.

Black-capped Chickadees can be easily confused with their more southern cousin, the Carolina Chickadee, but fortunately for us they tend to stick to their range maps. We are firmly in the "black-capped" region, but if you go not too far away, like Fort Wayne or Lafayette, they both occur and you will have to be able to tell them apart. By sound is the easiest way, as Carolinas have a four-note song, whereas Blackcapped have a two- or three-note "Hey Sweetie" or "Cheeseburger" song.

We think of these birds as "feeder birds," and they are, especially in winter. But their diets consist of about 50% animals (insects and spiders) in winter and a whopping 80% animals from spring through fall! They nest in tree cavities and bird houses.

Their name-sake "chick-a-dee-dee" warning call helps identify them in the field, but did you know the number of "dee"s on the end indicates the severity of the threat? If you hear one calling with 4 "dee"s, for instance, be on the lookout for a nearby hawk or owl!
