OCTOBER BIG DAY FIELD TRIPS

SBEAS is teaming up with Indiana Audubon Society and Indiana Land Protection Alliance to host October Big Day walks on October 14th at Ambler Flatwoods in Michigan City and Lydick Bog in St. Joseph County, two State Dedicated Nature Preserves. Hikes are also being held at various other locations around the state on the same day.

Lindsay Grossmann of our chapter will be leading the walk around Ambler Flatwoods, managed by Shirley Heinze Land Trust. The terrain is flat but it may be muddy, especially if there has been a recent rain; come prepared. Birds to be expected include our resident and recently landed winter visitor forest dwellers as well as some late-season migrants such as kinglets, possibly a late warbler or two, and Lindsay's personal favorite, the Yellow-bellied Sapsucker (a special effort will be made for them)!

Evie Kirkwood of our chapter will be leading the hike at Lydick Bog, where the terrain is slightly hilly.

Registration for the hikes is free but required at https://www.eventbrite.com/e/2023-october-big-day-hikes-with-ilpa-tickets-704875460477. Please be sure to select the right location! Alternatively, you can email Carol Goodall at fieldtrips@sbeaudubon.org and she will make a reservation for you. Space is limited.

Ambler Flatwoods is located on Meer Road/N600W, which is the first road on your right immediately after the I-94 interchange as you travel on US-20 towards Michigan City. The parking lot will be on the left-hand side of the road approximately 2 miles down (https://maps.app.goo.gl/TUkxNMGEKrvqwEU16). The walk will begin promptly around 9:00 a.m. CST (that's 10:00 a.m. for us EST folk).

Lydick Bog is located on US-20/West Lincolnway, just over a mile west of the US-20/US-31 Bypass. The parking lot is on the south side of the road (https://maps.app.goo.gl/tsgNrguLJgzxkQCj6). The walk will begin promptly at 9:00 a.m. EST.

We hope you can join us at one of these hikes!

OCTOBER MEMBERSHIP MEETING



Please join us for our October membership meeting on Sunday, October 8th at 2:00 p.m. at Rum Village Park's nature center in South Bend. Our program speakers will be Linda and Gene Matzat. The Matzats live on 158 acres in St. Joseph County, south of Potato Creek State Park. Linda and Gene met while attending Purdue University. Linda majored in Wildlife Science. Gene studied Agronomy and Agricultural Economics. Their combined work history has involved the Lake County Parks Dept., forestry, Indiana DNR, family farming, Purdue Extension Service, 4-H, and education.

They bought their first 80 acres in 1991, mainly because it contained protected woodlands. In 2003, they converted an abandoned pasture on their property into a prairie by planting native grasses and forbs. In 2015, their next-door neighbors offered Gene and Linda the opportunity to buy the neighbors' 80 acres. The new acreage contained more woodlands, but also included an area that previous owners had unsuccessfully tried to farm by digging a drainage ditch. That area eventually became covered with invasive wetland grasses. With the help from others, the Matzats were able to restore about 4.5 acres back to wetland by plugging the drainage ditch. They also eliminated invasive species in an area next to their new wetland of similar size and instead planted native grasses, sedges, rushes, and forbs. They are happy to share with SBEAS their story of wetland restoration and the wildlife it has attracted!

GREAT EGRET (ARDEA ALBA)

The only large white heron to be seen locally, the Great Egret, has a remarkable comeback story. Initially hunted to near extinction for the making of fashion accessories in the late 1800s, specifically the long feathery plumes that grow on the male's back during the breeding season being used to adorn ladies' hats, this species sparked a conservation movement to protect them. Interestingly, this effort resulted in the formation of the Massachusetts Audubon Society and eventually the National Audubon Society, of which we are a chapter! Today their numbers are stable, even increasing as they expand their range. Places like Potato Creek State Park and Boot Lake Nature Preserve get an occasional bird, but they are more common in northwest Indiana. They have similar habitat preferences to their more common and slightly larger cousin, the Great Blue Heron. Speaking of which, there is a color morph of the Great Blue, known as the Great White Heron, but it is restricted geographically to Florida and has other distinguishing differences.

Great Egrets use their large, dagger-like, yellow bills to hunt fish, frogs, aquatic insects, and small aquatic mammals and birds in marshes. They wade in the water, often belly deep, and stealth-stalk their prey. They are also highly mobile and you may spot them flying with their long black legs trailing behind them and their neck held in the classic "S" shape all herons adopt in flight. Keep your eyes out for this graceful bird!
