MAY FIELD TRIP TO ST. MARY'S

On May 4th we will bird the St. Mary's Nature Area. The Nature Area trail is a wonderful place to see neotropical migrants in the spring. This will be a lengthy walk, but most of the terrain is flat. The trail along the river can be a little precarious so wear sturdy shoes. Plan to be out most of the morning. We will meet at 7:30 a.m. in the northwest corner of the parking lot at the end of Madeleva Drive. To get there turn west off US-31 on Brother Andre Drive (this is the road to the south of The Inn at St. Mary's). Turn at the first right, which is Madeleva Drive. Madeleva Drive curves around and dead ends near our meetup location. Our meetup place is here: https://maps.app.goo.gl/ located DwXBOWvAHxtdAB7v6.

FROM THE MINUTES

The April 14, 2024 SBEAS Membership Meeting at Rum Village Nature Center was called to order by President Tai Gunter at 2:00 p.m. Fifty-two (52) members and guests were in attendance. Tai welcomed everyone and called for bird sightings. Eastern Towhees are back, Wild Turkeys are displaying, and an American Woodcock was spotted at the Sanctuary.

Election of Officers

Tai introduced the following slate of nominees:

President: Tai Gunter

Vice President: Carol Goodall

Secretary: John Bentley Treasurer: Mark Gidley

Director to 2027: Bruce Cates Director to 2027: Jeet Raval

There were no further nominations, and Tai called for a motion to approve the slate. Jim Fuermeyer so moved, Marie Smith seconding, and the motion carried. Tai reported that Joel Ralston has been appointed to complete the term of Mark Gidley, who resigned his Directorship to accept the Treasurer nomination.

Name Change Voting Procedure

Tai described the processes for collecting ballots for the name change vote. People who send in the ballot that was printed in the *Audubon Leaves* must do so by April 26th, but people who wished to vote at the April membership meeting could do so by submitting the ballot in a sealed envelope with their name on the exterior. All ballots will be kept sealed until the voting period is over, when they will be tabulated.

Treasurer's Report

Martha Kummerer reported that the operating account stood at \$25,679.19 on March 31st, and the Endowment account at \$21,094.44, of which \$6,495.24 will be transferred to the Dickey account when the CD matures. The Dickey account will fund the Riemenschneider Scholarships. The 2023 Annual Appeal has to date brought in \$8,340 from 129 donors.

Committee Reports

Conservation. Jen Betz reported that she wants an active Conservation Committee, and mentioned that former Conservation Chair Laura Federer has volunteered to serve on the committee. One of the things she would like the committee to do is research data on window kills of birds in downtown South Bend. She also reported that St. Joseph County's Comprehensive Land Use Task Force will receive a report from the consultants on May 14th.

<u>Education.</u> Melissa Gunter reported that she gave a program at Providence Nursing Home on April 10th, and will give one for home-schooled students at the Kroc Center on April 24th. She will need volunteers to staff an Audubon table at upcoming events such as Elkhart Envirofest, Riverfest, and Plant Pride 2024.

<u>Field Trips.</u> Carol Goodall reported that 15 or so people attended the Woodcock Walk and were treated to quite a display. Carol is loading up the schedule over the next month to take advantage of the Spring migration.

<u>Hospitality.</u> Alice Bentley reported that refreshments at the meeting were provided by Margo Shearman-Howard, Dee Howard, and Natasha Iuston. She asked for hospitality volunteers for the 2024-25 season.

<u>Programs.</u> Bruce Cates introduced Jan McGowan, who gave a presentation after the business meeting on the Wild Ones organization and native plantings.

<u>Publicity.</u> Carol mentioned that the Society's Facebook page has 2,500 followers, and that she has reactivated our Instagram account.

<u>Sanctuary.</u> Bradley Waelbroeck reported that the April work day work crew pulled seven bags of garlic mustard, removed a downed tree, and installed two new birdhouses (built by Merilee Britt). Bradley is still fighting with the tractor's electrical system. He and Tai procured a battery and have installed lights in the winter quarters.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2:27 p.m.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU FIND A BABY BIRD

From Project Feederwatch

As the nesting season ramps up, so do encounters with baby birds. If you find a baby bird, the first thing to do is to determine if it is a nestling or a fledgling. If the bird is fully feathered and alert, it is probably a fledgling and should be left alone. Most baby birds people find are fledglings that have left the nest but haven't quite gotten the hang of flying yet and are still under their parents' care. Move away from the bird, and if you wish, watch from a distance to see that an adult is in the vicinity and caring for the bird.

If you find a bird that is unable to hop or walk and has areas of bare skin, it could be a nestling, in which case you can try to find a nest in the vicinity. If you can find the nest, you can place the bird back into the nest and then move away to watch from a distance.

When in doubt, your best course of action is to contact a wildlife rehabilitator. The Humane Society of the United States has a website that lists wildlife rehabilitators by state. In North America, the Migratory Bird Treaty Act prohibits handling or possessing most wild birds without a federal permit, so do not keep or attempt to raise any wild birds that you find. Learn more about the best way to respond to a baby bird on the Cornell Lab's NestWatch website.

PIED-BILLED GREBE (PODILYMBUS PODICEPS)

A small, chunky water bird, the Pied-billed Grebe is the most common grebe seen locally. Overall, they are brown with a silver bill on which is a vertical black stripe during breeding season. This bicolor is what gives them the "pied" part of their name. Males and females look alike, but nonbreeding plumage birds lack the colorful bill and are just brown all over.

You will most likely find this bird in a marsh, pond, or lake, where its head will look disproportionally large compared to its small body. Although they may superficially resemble a duck, they are in fact more closely related to flamingos than ducks. They have large, lobed feet (not webbed like ducks), which are far at the back of their bodies. This makes them superb swimmers, but not so good at walking on land. Hence, they spend the majority of their time on the water, even setting their nests on floating vegetation, typically in tall vegetation. They dive underwater to feed on aquatic life such as insects, crayfish, and small fish.

Finally, a fun fact: they are like little submarines in that they can dive very quickly and submerge themselves at various levels by trapping water in their feathers. With high maneuverability, they can use this to both escape predators and catch food.
